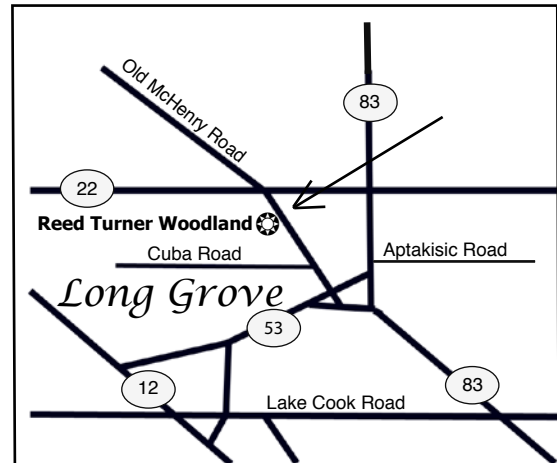
Who exactly are we?
